Koh Beng Swee



Japanese warplanes were bombing the area around his house in Dublin Road in late 1941 when then 17-year-old Koh Beng Swee was studying at home for his School Certificate (O-Level equivalent) exams.

That terrifying experience made him all the more determined to pass his exams and go on to fulfil his dream of becoming an engineer. He did it, after the war! He cycled to night school, took on a draughtsman's job at the Public Works Department (PWD) and excelled in the Member of the Institute of Structural Engineers (M.I.Struct.E) exams. Later, he was in the design team tasked to build the iconic former National Library at Stamford Road.

Mr Koh died in June 2019. He always had a heart for those in need, and the Koh Beng Swee Bursaries are part of his legacy.
